

FAYETTE COUNTY LEGISLATIVE BODY

January 23, 2001

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BE IT REMEMBERED That the Fayette County Legislative Body met in regular session at the Courthouse in Somerville, Tennessee, on the 23rd day of January, 2001.

Present and presiding the Honorable Jim Voss. Also present, Dell T. Graham, County Clerk and the following County Commissioners: John W. Arnett, Floyd Bonner, Charles Dudley Brewer, Sr., Joe B. Burnette, Jr., Odis Cox, Carl Doyle, Ronnie Graves, Willie German, Ronnie Harris, David Kelley, Sylvester Logan, Calvin Moore, Alonzo Morman, Jr., David Morris, John S. Sullivan, Sr., Rhea "Skip" Taylor, Wayne Thomas and Myles Wilson.

Absent: Commissioner Gordon M. Tomlin.

With a quorum being present, the following proceedings were had and entered of record, to-wit:

Motion was made by Commissioner Kelley, seconded by Commissioner German and unanimously carried by the Board approving the minutes of the November 2000 meeting.

The next matter before the Board was the rezoning of twelve (12) acres of property of Charles and Ada Mae Henley, located in Civil District 8, from R - 3 to SA and B - 3 for the purpose of a funeral home construction and a cemetery.

Having been reviewed by the Planning Commission, this was presented with their recommendation for approval.

Chairman Voss then opened the floor to the public for comments in favor of and in opposition of the rezoning. With none being presented, the floor was closed. Motion was made by Commissioner Kelley, seconded by Commissioner Doyle and unanimously carried by the Board approving the rezoning of the property, same being described as follows:

Beginning at a set  $\frac{1}{2}$ " rebar with plastic cap in the south line of U.S. Highway No. 64 (R.O.W. varies), said point being located in the west line of the Charles N. Henley and wife Ada Mae Henley property recorded in Book 506, Page 217; thence north 84 degrees 55 minutes 57 seconds east with the south line of said U.S. Highway No. 64, 348.01 feet to a found concrete monument; thence across said property recorded in Book 506, Page 217 the following calls; south 05 degrees 13 minutes 25 seconds west, 766.40 feet to a set  $\frac{1}{2}$ " rebar with plastic cap; south 84 degrees 55 minutes 57 seconds west, 342.04 feet to a set  $\frac{1}{2}$ " rebar with plastic cap in the east line of the William A. Mabon and wife Gladys H. Mabon property recorded in Book 157, Page 120, thence north 04 degrees 17 minutes 23 seconds east line of said property recorded in Book 157, page 120, 360.56 feet

to a set  $\frac{1}{2}$ " rebar with plastic cap in south line of the Jamerica Person Estate property; thence north 05 degrees 13 minutes 25 seconds east with the east line of said Jamerica Person Estate property, 404.82 feet to the point of beginning and containing 6,000 acres of land.

Beginning at a found concrete monument in the south line of U.S. Highway No. 64 (R.O.W. varies), said point being located 348.01 feet east of the west line of said property recorded in Book 506, Page 217 as measured along the south line of said U.S. Highway No. 64, thence north 80 degrees 23 minutes 41 seconds east along the south line of said U.S. Highway No. 64, 624.65 feet to a set  $\frac{1}{2}$ " rebar with plastic cap in the centerline of existing gravel drive; thence across said property recorded in Book 506, Page 217 the following calls; south 17 degrees 13 minutes, 17 seconds east, 278.44 feet to a set  $\frac{1}{2}$ " rebar with plastic cap; south 12 degrees 44 minutes 01 seconds west; 109.71 feet to a set  $\frac{1}{2}$ " rebar with plastic cap; south 80 degrees 23 minutes 41 seconds west, 719.79 feet to a set  $\frac{1}{2}$ " rebar with plastic cap; north 05 degrees 13 minutes 25 seconds east, 390.46 feet to the point of beginning and containing 6,000 acres of land.

Now before the Board was the rezoning request of Cleaves Enterprises, Inc. regarding 117 acres of property located in Civil District 10 to be rezoned from R - 1 to R - 3 for a residential subdivision.

This was presented with the recommendation of the Planning Commission for approval.

Chairman Voss then opened the floor to the public for comments in favor of and in opposition to the rezoning. With none being offered, the floor was closed to the public.

Motion was then made by Commissioner Moore, seconded by Commissioner Morris, to approve the rezoning request. Said motion carried with Commissioners Sullivan and Graves voting "no".

Said property being as follows:

Beginning at an iron as found in the center of an old road bed on the EBL of the T. King property, being the NW corner of the William Wade property (231/389 & 283/279), runs thence with the center of said road bed and the EBL of the T. King property, the EBL of the W. Rooks property, the EBL of the L. King property, the EBL of the G. Jones property, the EBL of the J. Jones property, the EBL of the K. Jones property, the EBL of the M. Bracher property, the EBL of the M. Bamette property, the EBL of the J. Carroll property, the EBL of the J. Freeman property, the EBL of the M. Deener property, the EBL of the M. Waller property and the EBL of the D. Jones property N 01 deg 00 min 40 sec E 4113.64 ft to a cotton picker spindle in the center of Sellers Drive, being the NE corner of said D. Jones property, thence with the center of said road S 84 deg 50 min E 129 ft. S 88 deg 20 min E 338 ft S 87 deg E 160 ft. S 84 deg 40 min E 400 ft. S 89 deg 15 min E 105 ft. and S 85 deg 30 min E 85 ft. to a cotton picker spindle, being the NW corner of the Katherine Moore property (529/508), thence with the WBL of said Moore property South 4074.5 ft. to an iron as found in the NBL of said Wade property, being the SW corner of said Mopre property, thence with said NBL N 88 deg 58 min W 1286.92 ft. to the point of beginning, containing 117.437 acres more or less. This being the Robert Smith property as shown in deed book 39, page 175, in the Fayette County Register's Office.

Now before the Board was the election of a County Attorney.

Motion was made by Commissioner Morris, seconded by Commissioner Doyle and unanimously carried by the board electing Richard Rosser as County Attorney. Chairman Voss noted that the salary would remain as previously set and would receive the same increase as set for county employees.

Motion was made by Commissioner Graves, seconded by Commissioner Brewer and unanimously carried by the Board appointing the following as Notaries Public: Nell R. Atkeison, Susan K. Brinkley, Linda McNabb Dollahite, Steven W. Glover, Doris C. Green, Frances C.A. Morrow.

Chairman Voss made the following committee changes: from the Health and Welfare Committee to the Education Committee, Commissioner Floyd Bonner; to the Health and Welfare Committee, Commissioner Willie German. Motion was made by Commissioner Sullivan, seconded by Commissioner Arnett, and unanimously carried by the Board approving the appointments.

Written report on combined statement of cash receipts and disbursements was filed by the Trustee, Barbra Parker.

Motion was made by Commissioner Kelley, seconded by Commissioner Arnett and unanimously carried by the Board approving the following Resolution by Fayette County Pertaining to Funding of Human Resource Agencies.

## **RESOLUTION BY FAYETTE COUNTY**

### **PERTAINING TO FUNDING OF HUMAN RESOURCE AGENCIES**

Whereas, the Human Resource Agency Act of 1973, T.C.A. 13-28-101 et seq., created the delivery system for human services in the State of Tennessee, and

Whereas, Fayette County is a member of the Delta Human Resource Agency with its County Mayor serving by statute on the governing board of the agency, and

Whereas, T.C.A. 13-16-107 and 13-26-111 provide that it is the intent of the State to assist financing with the delivery of human resources for its residents and authorizes the State to match the .15 per capita paid by Lauderdale County local government contributions in an amount of \$90,000.00 Dollars annually for each human resource agency, and further provides that such funds be included in the budget requests of the Department of Human Service submitted to the Commissioner of Finance and Administration, and

Whereas, the annual budget requests by the Department of Human Services to the Department of Finance and Administration requesting the aforesaid matching funds have not been included in the proposed annual budget request by the state administration to the General Assembly which has resulted in a critical fiscal hardship to the human resource agencies, and

Whereas, the budget request of the Tennessee Development Districts which serve the same coterminous boundaries as the human resource agencies have been included in the annual budget proposals of the state administration.

**NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the County Commission of Fayette County, the County Mayor concurring, in strong support of the worthy efforts and performance of the Human Resource Agencies of Tennessee, respectfully request that the budget requests for matching funds on behalf of the Human Resource Services be included in the proposed budget to be submitted by the state administration for fiscal year 2001-2002 and future budgets thereafter.

Report of the Board of Public Works was filed.

Aubrey Bond, Superintendent of Schools, reported for the Board of Education and reviewed Budget Amendments.

Reports from the County Commission on Aging, Sheriff's Department and Juvenile Court were filed.

Commissioner Morris reported for the County Development Committee and presented for approval the County Road Map and road list. After discussion, motion was made by Commissioner Morris, seconded by Commissioner Taylor, and unanimously carried by the Board approving same.

Commissioner Morris then presented for action by this Board the matter of a road off of Chapel Road. This matter was reviewed by Commissioner Morman who made motion that this road be shown on the Road Map and be maintained as a county road as long as there were two documents and two witnesses to show that there was previously a road there and that the removal of the road land-locked the property. Motion was seconded by Commissioner Wilson. Upon roll call, the following voted "YES" to the motion: Commissioners Arnett, Bonner, Brewer, Cox, Doyle, Kelley, Logan, Morman and Wilson. (9)

Voting "NO": Commissioners Burnette, Graves, German, Harris, Moore, Morris, Sullivan, Taylor and Thomas. (9)

For lack of a majority of the vote, said motion failed.

Commissioner Morris presented the recommendation of the Development Committee to accept the extension of Pulliam Road as a County Road. Motion to accept the recommendation was made by Commissioner Morris, seconded by Commissioner Doyle and unanimously carried by the Board.

Commissioner Morris asked that Jim Smith of Public Works Department address the Board on an emergency situation with a collapsed culvert on Bellemeade Road in Hickory Withe.

It was recommended by the Development Committee that the County make the repair, but that they be reimbursed for expense; that the County be given a hold-harmless agreement to the extent that the tort of liability of the State of Tennessee allows, and to the extent that their insurance allows. Motion to accept the recommendation of the Development Committee was made by Commissioner Kelley, seconded by Commissioner Graves, and unanimously carried by the Board.

Commissioner Morris and Chairman Voss reviewed impact, development fees and realty transfer tax, which would again be reviewed by the Development Committee and brought back before this Board.

Motion was made by Commissioner Kelley, seconded by Commissioner Burnette, and unanimously carried by the Board approving the following **RESOLUTION** for authorization of a local option realty transfer tax through the General Assembly:

**FIRST READING**                    **RESOLUTION TO URGE THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY  
TO AUTHORIZE A LOCAL OPTION REALTY TRANSFER TAX**

WHEREAS, many counties in the State of Tennessee are struggling to find sufficient revenue sources in order to meet the growing demands of their citizens for services which are vital and fundamental to the health, welfare, and safety of the residents of this state, to provide improvements to infrastructure required by population and economic growth, and to meet state mandates such as those required by the Basic Education Program, and,

WHEREAS, meeting the demands for capital improvements required by the standards and mandates of the Basic Education Program has been especially burdensome on the financial resources of county governments for that last few years, with a record amount of debt being incurred for school construction and renovation; and

WHEREAS, county governments are limited by state law regarding the forms of taxation and revenue generation which the county is authorized to use, leaving many counties overly dependant on the property tax as a primary source of revenue; and

WHEREAS, proposed legislation to authorize counties to levy a local option transfer tax would provide a desperately needed additional revenue source for counties by authorizing county legislative bodies to levy, by a resolution adopted by a 2/3 vote at two consecutive regular meetings, a tax on the privilege of recording instruments that transfer interests in real property in the office of deeds in the same manner and amount as the state transfer tax; and

WHEREAS, this proposed legislation would be permissive and would not levy a tax, but merely authorize counties to levy a transfer tax if the county legislative body finds it is in the best interest of the county to do so;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of County Commissioners of Fayette County, meeting in regular session on this 23rd day of January, 2000, that the Tennessee General Assembly is strongly urged to pass the proposed local option transfer tax legislation, in order to provide needed fiscal relief to county governments.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the county clerk shall mail certified copies of this resolution to the members of the Tennessee General Assembly representing the people of Fayette County.

**FIRST READING**

Report was called for from the Education Committee, but none available.

\* \* \* \* \*

Commissioner Kelley, Chairman of the Public Safety Committee, advised that this committee has met with the Sheriff, County Mayor and representatives of the Department of Corrections addressing location and/or construction of new jail facility for the County. This Committee is awaiting reports from the Department of Corrections.

Reports were called for from the Health & Welfare Committee and Personnel Committee, but none available.

Ed Gaugh addressed the Board on County-Wide Fire Protection. Much discussion followed.

With motion by Commissioner German, seconded by Commissioner Burnette, and so ordered for a five minute recess.

Meeting is now back in session.

By oral consensus a Private Act will be presented at the next meeting of this Board covering county-wide fire protection, setting fees and how these fees are to be collected.

Chairman Harris, Chairman of the Budget Committee, presented and moved for the adoption of the following amendments to the County General Fund and the Board of Education. Motion was seconded by Commissioner Doyle and unanimously carried by the Board approving the following amendments:

### RESOLUTION

BE IT RESOLVED, by the County Legislative Body and/or the Board of County Commissioners of Fayette County, Tennessee, in regular session on this 23rd day of January, 2001, it being the fourth Tuesday of the month and the regular monthly meeting of the County Legislative Body in the Courthouse in Somerville, Tennessee.

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Discussion on the conservation areas will be held at the next meeting.

Chairman Voss addressed the Board on EMT liability and recommended legislation that would exempt EMT's from being held liable for any injuries they might cause or errors they may make during patient treatment.

Motion was made by Commissioner Graves, seconded by Commissioner Taylor, and unanimously carried by the Board that a Resolution be submitted to the State of Tennessee seeking the enactment of such legislation.

Commissioner Graves questioned the legality of the Parks & Recreation Board replacing the Conservation Board. This will be addressed at the next meeting by Commissioner Tomlin.
